Taking a few hours now to organize your important documents and put them in a safe place can save you many frustrating hours later. You may never experience a disaster, but the peace of mind gained from organizing your records will be well worth the few hours spent on this important task.


Safe Deposit Boxes & Home Safes are two ways to protect your records and other irreplaceable items from disaster.

What You Should Store In a Safe Deposit Box:

Originals of records that would be difficult to replace:

- Birth, Death, and Marriage Certificates
- Divorce and Child Custody Papers

- Adoption Papers
- Passports
- Military Records
- Social Security Cards
- Copies of Drivers' Licenses
- Mortgage/Property Deeds
- Stocks and Bond Certificates
- Car Titles



PASSPORT

- Copies of Power of Attorney, Living Will, and other Medical Powers
- Trust Documents
- Copy of your Will

Note: The original of your will should not be kept in a safe deposit box because the bank may seal the box temporarily at your death. Keep the original of your will at your lawyer's office and copies of it at home and in your safe deposit box.

If you would rather store all your documents at home in a home safe instead of at a bank:



Safe should be able to withstand fire (1700 degrees), flood, or a tornado.

Place the safe in the basement to decrease the risk of it falling through the floor in the event of a fire.

Renter's Insurance

Add up the value of all your belongings. You're probably looking at thousands of dollars. Could you afford to replace your property if it were damaged during a fire?

Why You Need Renters Insurance

Your landlord has insurance, but it probably only covers the building where you live – not your belongings or your liability for accidents. If your possessions are damaged by a fire or severe weather, a renters insurance policy will allow you to recover their value. If someone is injured during an accident in your home, renters insurance will help protect you in the case a liability lawsuit.
